

ABSTRACT

This is a report of what was carried out in Soroti District Local Government during the internship. The activities implemented were categorized into three sections i.e., office work, field work and public health. CHAPTER ONE

INTRODUCTION



1.1 Background of Soroti district

The District Veterinary Office is under the local government dealing in aspects of animal (livestock). The activities carried out were done according to the work plan designed by the field supervisor. This work plan was designed on the first day of reporting, capturing three (3) areas; office work, Abattoir and field. I participated in all the three categorized activities.

1.2 Location of Soroti district veterinary office

Soroti district veterinary office is located in Soroti district, Soroti municipality, central cell opposite and Soroti sports ground.

1.3 Historical Background of Soroti district local government

The growth of Soroti dates as far back as 1904 when the district commissioner of Mbale sent Kakungulu to open up some administration units in Serere, Gweri and Soroti areas, parts of Kakungulu's team camped near the rock at Soroti and settled there. The choice of this site was a camping site and was probably influenced by the availability of good drinking water from the nearby streams and the fact that the rock had some advantages in the matter of dams for settlers from the local inhabitants around under the organized and rule of Kakungulu.

Local inhabitants were forced to clear the forests and within a few days, a large area had been cleared and considerable amount of settlement had taken place. Thatched houses for administrative purposes of Soroti County were put, stands and dispensaries in temporally materials stood at the site of present Soroti hospital.

Later on with the coming of the Asian traders, small shops in the semi-permanent materials were put in Soroti. The traders brought clothes, salt, beads, shoes were traded with exchange for skins, beans, chicken and ground nuts (batter trade).

In 1912 Soroti attained the status of permanent headquarters of Teso region as a result of recommendation by Sir. Fredrick Jackson after the appointment as the new governor of Uganda.
